PER CURIAM:*

Jose Alberto Canales-Matute appeals his guilty plea conviction and sentence for being unlawfully found in the United States after deportation following an aggravated felony conviction. He challenges the constitutionality of 8 U.S.C. § 1326(b)'s treatment of prior felony and aggravated felony convictions as sentencing factors rather than elements of the offense that must be found by a jury in light of Apprendi v. New Jersey, 530 U.S. 466 (2000). The Government contends that Canales-Mutate's challenge is barred by the appeal-waiver

provision in his plea agreement. The Government seeks enforcement of the waiver provision.

We assume, arquendo only, that the waiver does not bar the instant appeal. Canales-Matute's constitutional challenge is foreclosed by Almendarez-Torres v. United States, 523 U.S. 224, 235 (1998). Although Canales-Matute contends that Almendarez-Torres was incorrectly decided and that a majority of the Supreme Court would overrule Almendarez-Torres in light of Apprendi, we have repeatedly rejected such arguments on the basis that Almendarez-Torres remains binding. See United States v. Garza-Lopez, 410 F.3d 268, 276 (5th Cir.), cert. denied, 126 S. Ct. 298 (2005). Canales-Matute properly concedes that his argument is foreclosed in light of Almendarez-Torres and circuit precedent, but he raises it here to preserve it for further review.

AFFIRMED.
