William Morris Risby, federal prisoner # 31495-077, has filed an application for leave to proceed in forma pauperis (IFP) on appeal, following the denial of his motion for appointment of counsel in a civil action seeking the return of seized property. We must examine the basis of our jurisdiction sua sponte if necessary. <u>Mosley v. Cozby</u>, 813 F.2d 659, 660 (5th Cir. 1987).

Generally, this court's jurisdiction is limited to final decisions of district courts. 28 U.S.C. § 1291. The denial of

appointed counsel does not conclude litigation and is therefore not a final decision. <u>Marler v. Adonis Health Prods.</u>, 997 F.2d 1141, 1142 (5th Cir. 1993). Risby's case is a civil action against the Government. <u>Pena v. United States</u>, 122 F.3d 3, 4 (5th Cir. 1997). As such, this court does not have jurisdiction over an interlocutory order denying appointment of counsel. <u>See</u> <u>Marler</u>, 997 F.3d at 1143. Accordingly, the appeal is DISMISSED for lack of jurisdiction. Risby's motion for leave to proceed IFP on appeal is DENIED.
