PER CURTAM:*

Francisco Javier Hernandez-Negrete ("Hernandez") appeals following his guilty-plea conviction and 57-month sentence of imprisonment on one count of being found in the United States, without permission, following removal after having been convicted of an aggravated felony.

For the first time on appeal, Hernandez argues that the sentencing provisions in 8 U.S.C. § 1326(b) are unconstitutional because they do not require the fact of a prior felony or

aggravated felony conviction to be charged in the indictment and proved beyond a reasonable doubt. He contends that his sentence is invalid, and he argues that it should not exceed the two-year maximum term of imprisonment prescribed in 8 U.S.C. § 1326(a).

Hernandez acknowledges that his argument is foreclosed by <u>Almendarez-Torres v. United States</u>, 523 U.S. 224 (1998), but he asserts that the decision has been cast into doubt by <u>Apprendi v. New Jersey</u>, 530 U.S. 466, 490 (2000). He seeks to preserve his argument for further review.

Apprendi did not overrule Almendarez-Torres. See Apprendi,
530 U.S. at 489-90; United States v. Dabeit, 231 F.3d 979, 984

(5th Cir. 2000). This court must follow Almendarez-Torres

"unless and until the Supreme Court itself determines to overrule
it." Dabeit, 231 F.3d at 984 (internal quotation marks and citation omitted).

AFFIRMED.
