PER CURIAM:*

Juan Pedro Hipolito-Trevino (Hipolito) appeals the 41-month sentence he received after pleading guilty to one count of illegal reentry into the United States after having been deported. See 8 U.S.C. § 1326.

Hipolito contends that his sentence violated due process and should have been limited to two years because his indictment failed to allege the prior drug-trafficking conviction. As he

concedes, this contention is foreclosed by <u>Almendarez-Torres v.</u>
United States, 523 U.S. 224 (1998).

Hipolito also contends that he is entitled to resentencing because the district court sentenced him under a mandatory application of the guidelines that has been prohibited by <u>United States v. Booker</u>, 125 S. Ct. 738, 756-57, 769 (2005). Because Hipolito did not raise this issue in the district court, we review for plain error. <u>United States v. Valenzuela-Quevedo</u>, 407 F.3d 728, 732 (5th Cir. 2005). Although there was an error under <u>Booker</u>, Hipolito fails to demonstrate that the district court would have imposed a different sentence under advisory guidelines. <u>Id.</u> at 733. He therefore fails to show that the error affected his substantial rights as is necessary under the plain-error standard. <u>See id.</u>; <u>United States v. Mares</u>, 402 F.3d 511, 521-22 (5th Cir. 2005), <u>petition for cert. filed</u> (Mar. 31, 2005) (No. 04-9517).

The judgment of the district court is AFFIRMED.
