PER CURIAM:*

Jaime Zagal-Meraz (Zagal) appeals his conviction and sentence for illegal reentry. Zagal contends that his Minnesota conviction for simple possession of a controlled substance is a misdemeanor under federal law and should not have been treated as an "aggravated felony" under U.S.S.G. § 2L1.2(b)(1)(C) and that 8 U.S.C. § 1326(b)(1) & (2) are unconstitutional in light of Apprendi v. New Jersey, 530 U.S. 466 (2000).

Zagal's § 2L1.2(b)(1)(C) argument is unavailing in light of our precedent. See <u>United States v. Rivera</u>, 265 F.3d 310, 312-13

(5th Cir. 2001); <u>United States v. Hinojosa-Lopez</u>, 130 F.3d 691, 693-94 (5th Cir. 1997). Zagal argues that our precedent is inconsistent with <u>Jerome v. United States</u>, 318 U.S. 101 (1943). Having preceded <u>Hinojosa-Lopez</u>, however, <u>Jerome</u> is not "an intervening Supreme Court case explicitly or implicitly overruling that prior precedent." <u>See United States v. Short</u>, 181 F.3d 620, 624 (5th Cir. 1999).

Zagal's constitutional challenge to § 1326(b) is foreclosed by Almendarez-Torres v. United States, 523 U.S. 224, 235 (1998). Although Zagal contends that Almendarez-Torres was incorrectly decided and that a majority of the Supreme Court would overrule Almendarez-Torres in light of Apprendi, we have repeatedly rejected such arguments on the basis that Almendarez-Torres remains binding. See United States v. Garza-Lopez, 410 F.3d 268, 276 (5th Cir.), cert. denied, 126 S. Ct. 298 (2005). Zagal properly concedes that his argument is foreclosed in light of Almendarez-Torres and circuit precedent, but he raises it here to preserve it for further review.

AFFIRMED.
