Robert Kaltenbach appeals from the order of the district court denying him authorization to file his complaint, pursuant to a 1992 sanction order requiring prior authorization.

Kaltenbach contends that the sanction order deprived him of his right of access to the courts and his right to equal protection

of the law. He also contends that his Fourth Amendment and due process rights were violated when his home was searched and property was seized pursuant to an allegedly invalid eviction warrant.

Kaltenbach did not appeal from the order imposing sanctions. His current challenge to that order amounts to an untimely appeal over which we lack jurisdiction. See United States v. Carr, 979 F.2d 51, 55 (5th Cir. 1992).

Kaltenbach does not contend that the district court erred by determining that his substantive claims would have been barred by Dist. of Columbia Court of Appeals v. Feldman, 460 U.S. 462, 476, 482 (1983), and Rooker v. Fidelity Trust Co., 263 U.S. 413, 415-16 (1923), had he been authorized to file his complaint. He has not shown that the district court should have allowed him to file his complaint.
