PER CURIAM:*

Leonel Mendoza-Yerbafria appeals his conviction and sentence for illegal reentry after removal, as well as the judgment revoking his term of

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supervised release for committing the new offense. He has not briefed, and has therefore abandoned, any challenge to the revocation of supervised release or his revocation sentence. *See Yohey v. Collins*, 985 F.2d 222, 224-25 (5th Cir. 1993).

For the first time on appeal, Mendoza-Yerbafria argues that his sentence exceeds the statutory maximum and is therefore unconstitutional because the district court enhanced his sentence under 8 U.S.C. § 1326(b) based on facts that were neither alleged in the indictment nor found by a jury beyond a reasonable doubt. While he acknowledges this argument is foreclosed by *Almendarez-Torres v. United States*, 523 U.S. 224 (1998), he nevertheless seeks to preserve it for possible Supreme Court review. In addition, Mendoza-Yerbafria has filed an unopposed motion for summary affirmance.

Subsequent Supreme Court decisions such as *Alleyne v. United States*, 570 U.S. 99 (2013), and *Apprendi v. New Jersey*, 530 U.S. 466 (2000), did not overrule *Almendarez-Torres. See United States v. Pervis*, 937 F.3d 546, 553-54 (5th Cir. 2019). Thus, Mendoza-Yerbafria is correct that his argument is foreclosed, and summary affirmance is appropriate. *See Groendyke Transp.*, *Inc. v. Davis*, 406 F.2d 1158, 1162 (5th Cir. 1969).

Mendoza-Yerbafria's motion is GRANTED, and the district court's judgments are AFFIRMED.
