PER CURIAM:\*

Tommy James Lee Horne appeals from his resentencing as an armed career criminal following his conviction of being a convicted felon in possession of a firearm and possessing a weapon made from a modified shotgun. Horne's sentence was enhanced based on his status as an armed career criminal. We previously remanded Horne's case for reconsideration in light of <a href="United States v. Booker">United States v. Booker</a>, 543 U.S. 220 (2005), and <a href="Shepard v. United States">Shepard v. United States</a>, 544 U.S. 13 (2005). <a href="United States v. Horne first contends that the district court erred by using two Michigan convictions for enhancement because his civil rights had been restored by operation of state law. That issue was beyond the scope of our remand, and the district court lacked discretion to consider it. See United States v. McCrimmon, 443 F.3d 454, 462 (5th Cir.), cert. denied, 126 S. Ct. 1931 (2006).

Horne next contends that <u>Booker</u> and <u>Shepard</u> required the district court to present the evidence of his prior convictions to a jury and for the jury to find those prior convictions beyond a reasonable doubt. We have rejected an identical contention.

Horne finally contends that he received inadequate notice of the Government's intention to use his prior convictions for enhancement. We decided that issue on Horne's first appeal.

Our previous determination constitutes the law of the case, and the issue was not subject to reexamination by the district court.
