## MEMORANDUM

Complainant, a state prisoner, has filed a complaint alleging misconduct by the subject United States District Judge in two 42 U.S.C. § 1983 proceedings.

Complainant complains that the judge's denial of his application to proceed in forma pauperis, dismissal of his lawsuit for failure to state a claim upon which relief may be granted, and imposition of a monetary sanction and a filing preclusion amount to "retaliation" and "extortion" and constitute evidence of "a plot" to "cover-up [the judge's and his] cronies' criminal protection racket with [local] billion-dollar corporations."

To the extent that these allegations relate directly to the merits of decisions or procedural rulings, they are subject to dismissal under 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(ii). In other respects, any assertions of retaliation, extortion, and criminal conspiracy appear entirely derivative of the merits-related charges, but to the extent the allegations are separate, they are wholly unsupported, and are therefore subject to dismissal under 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(iii) as "lacking sufficient evidence to raise an inference that misconduct has occurred."

Judicial misconduct proceedings are not a substitute for the normal appellate review process, nor may they be used to obtain reversal of a decision or a new trial.

This is complainant's tenth merits-related and conclusory complaint in nine months, and he has been warned previously against filing further merits-related, conclusory, frivolous, or repetitive complaints. Complainant's right to file complaints is hereby SUSPENDED pursuant to Rule 10(a), Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings. Complainant may show cause, through a petition for review submitted pursuant to Rule 18, why his right to file further complaints should not be so limited.

An order dismissing the complaint is entered simultaneously herewith.
